Although "unprecedented" is an overused word lately, it is difficult to find a more accurate description for the latter part of this last season. Patrols cancelled six weeks early in mid-March and Branch and Australian Championships also cancelled; mainly due to the COVID 19 virus.

The Nippers contingent continued to thrive due in no small part to the efforts of Rod McGibbon and Matthew and Rebecca Woodman. A pleasing feature was the number of awards attained by the Nippers and thanks must go to the aforementioned trio and the age managers who made it enjoyable for the little ones despite some less than ideal weather on a few Sunday mornings.

Patrols were another positive feature of the season and thanks go to Nick Fewtrell in his inaugural season as Director of Lifesaving with backup from Aidan Clark and Rod McGibbon when required. Barker students and staff continued their major contribution to patrols and activity on the beach on a Saturday and thanks to Rod McGibbon, Amber Clark, Josh Bryden, Aidan and Barker staff, not forgetting the man who makes it all happen, Matthew Lloyd. It is a far cry from the initial relationship with Barker where there were only about six students in the first year of this joint venture.

Offsetting, to a large extent, the doom and gloom of the economic and social upheaval was the news of young member Chloe Carr taking out the Female Junior Lifesaver of the Year for the Branch and the State, an amazing achievement which speaks volumes for her maturity and presentation.

The 2019-2020 season was a very interesting first season to take the mantle of Director of Lifesaving. The season being cut short by Surf Life Saving Australia to protect all members from the Covid-19 outbreak and paid lifeguards patrolling the remainder of the season, were things that I had never heard of happening in my experiences as a life saver.

Before the pandemic arose, we had a very strong season with little to no issues across all patrols and I thank all patrolling members for their performance throughout the season. We had great results in all inspections (the fact they inspected the same patrol every time does not need to be mentioned!) This is great to see, however, this year they have removed the competition and so there is no prize money up for grabs. As a club we have patrolled over 2500 hours collectively which is less than previous years (partially due to the end of the season being brought forward) thanks to there being an increase in members sharing the load of patrols. This has been a massive help to avoid people burning out.

I would like to make special mention to those patrolling members who assisted with Nippers on top of their patrolling duties. This is a huge help and allows us to run such a great program for the kids to learn some surf skills, and to have a fun time at the beach. It is great to see SRC members also getting involved in assisting with these activities, so a very special mention to Chloe Carr and Nick McGibbon for their help throughout the season running Nipper activities and patrolling so often.

On top of the assistance through Nippers I would like to say how proud I am that Chloe was also named Young Lifesaver of the Year for the Northern Beaches Branch and NSW. This is an incredible feat and puts both herself and Bungan on the map. Congratulations Chloe.

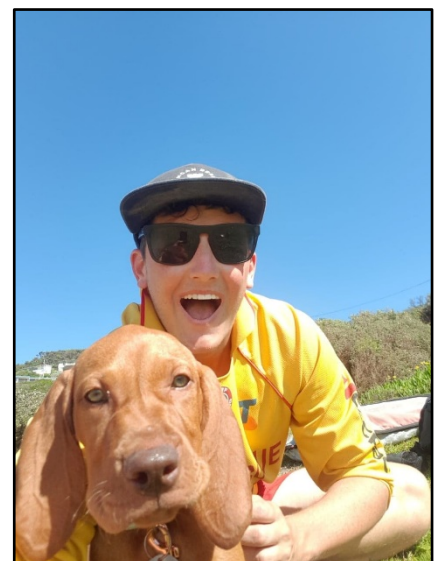

## DIRECTOR OF JUNIOR ACTIVITIES' REPORT

Like most recreational sporting programs, we had an unexpectedly early close to the 2019-2020 Bungan Beach Nippers season due to COVID-19.

Up until that point, we had had a fantastic summer, running weekly from late November until early this year. The kids improved significantly with their confidence in the water, on boards and at the beach in general. Their enthusiasm to get involved in all aspects of water and beach activities was awe-inspiring ... they were there, at the ready, whatever the wind, sun, rain or swell.

That's the thing with Bungan Beach - it is a challenging beach with no protected areas - beach conditions dictate Nipper activities as opposed to us having a set agenda to follow. As a result, our Nipper program was nimble, highly fluid and driven absolutely by the swell, tides and winds on the day. This season saw variable and extreme weather which required a significant amount of ingenuity to come up with safe and fun activities to maximise our Nippers' experience – the kids, for their part, were game for anything and everything. Obstacle courses, treasure hunts, weekend BBQs and a visit from Santa are just some of the additional activities with which our Nippers engaged this season, as well as boards, swimming and tons of beach fun.

This year we were lucky enough to have a group of teenage surf life savers helping us to run the Nipper activities, provide water safety and mentor the younger kids. There they were, every single Nipper day, regardless of conditions, offering their assistance, spending hours in the water with a Nipper who just wanted to keep swimming/board riding, and then showing up to do it all again the next weekend. This level of engagement added another dimension to our Nipper program - the younger kids really looked up to and loved hanging out with slightly older surf life savers. It was an impromptu mentoring/buddy system that was organic and highly successful. Thanks Chloe Carr, Nick McGibbon, Tegan Phelan and Stella Blaiklock.

## RACE SECRETARY AND HANDICAPPER'S REPORT

As in previous years when we have conducted three rounds of Club Championships, the final round again being a total contrast to the previous rounds.

Round 1 featured a sunny day with a 2-3 foot surf allowing all age groups to participate with enough of a wave to make it interesting. Newport Aussie medallist Madison Louw gave a masterclass in the Junior Surf and Open Board races, illustrating the result of intensive coaching, training and competition. Unfortunately, there were no other Open Female competitors. Competition was fierce in all other categories with Tom Slaney consistent over all categories in the Junior Men and Sophie Maltman prevailing in the Junior Women's beach events. Jacques McFarland featured in the Cadet Men while the Cadet Women's results were widely spread.

Sunshine and a heavier surf of up to 5 feet, saw the Round 2 underway in February. Steve Deveney came out of hiding to stamp his authority in the Open events although Hughie handed out a belting to him in the board race. Amber Clark and Madelyn Cross swapped places in the Open Women's beach events. Sophie Maltman continued her dominance in the Junior Women while Angus McNee was consistent in placings in the Junior Men. There were muttered comments from the older Open Male competitors about the "cheeky" Junior Men who backed up to enter Open events. All blandishments to Open, Junior and Cadet women to compete in board paddling events were rejected. Cadet events had similar results to Round 1.

The final round in March saw Open beach events only due to unpleasant weather and a dumping rip-torn surf. Josh Bryden took the honours in both sprint and flags with Dave Sheppard pushing all the way in the sprint. We were lucky to run this round with the COVID-19 restrictions being introduced shortly thereafter.

One area to concentrate on next season is board paddling for the Junior and Cadet Women and initiatives to encourage more Open Women to compete, especially in the surf events.

## OBITUARY - VALE - GORDON PATRICK JOSEPH HARMON

I was introduced to Gordon early in August 1969 by Dayne "Choppers" Coulton as Gordon had indicated to Dayne that he was thinking of transferring from Newport to Bungan Beach. During the conversation we had with him he said with a warning note in his voice, "I'm not a social sweep". That is, he swept crews to compete and win. The following three seasons he proved this beyond any scintilla of doubt.

Gordon was born in 1932 and was brought up by his grandmother at Bondi. As he grew older he gravitated to the surf and Bondi Bathers SLSC where he became involved in surfboats and sweeping. He began competitive sweeping at 16 and in 1956 won an Australian Junior Boat title with Bondi at Torquay, Victoria. He was sometimes known as "Mother Harmon" for his ability to look after his crews in big surf and to put the odds in his favour as far as possible when catching big waves, a skill for which he was renowned.

In the early '60's he moved to Newport and joined Bilgola where he swept their Open crews, but after a long lunch with Bert King was enticed to Newport in 1964 where he had success with their crews. With Ron Payne, the Junior sweep, itching to sweep Open crews Gordon apparently felt that the novice crew he had seen from Bungan had potential, so he decided to move to Bungan.

Taking on the position of Secretary and Boat Captain at the AGM (Rod Hall, the existing sweep, unselfishly stood aside) Gordon's impact on the Club was remarkable. One innovation was the introduction of volley medicine ball played with a medicine ball with volleyball rules, but the ball was caught and thrown. Rod Hall undertook to source a ball and turned up with a hernia-inducing 16lb ball rather than the standard 12lb ball. As a strengthening and fitness device it was unsurpassed. From a rather low-key start, Gordon assembled an inexperienced senior boat crew of Ed Ifould, Dave Sams, Stuart McNeill and John Chapman - all existing club members. Training sessions for skills and fitness increased in intensity while one never-to-be-forgotten (or repeated) session saw crew members in pairs with one running up the track with the 16lb medicine ball and then the other walking down holding the ball at arm's length!

The crew hit their stride in January 1970, gradually working their way up in consecutive carnivals from fourth until finally a first at Freshwater. Actually, the crew's initial win was the first leg from Kurnell to Yarra Bay of the Captain Cook Marathon with about 40 crews competing. After Freshwater the crew won the next three carnivals including Branch. Rough surf conditions at the State Championship resulted in a second place and nomination as the reserve crew for the State team, the only time a reserve crew has been selected. The memorable 1970 Australian Championships saw the crew swamped in the semi-final at Ocean Grove, Victoria which featured huge seas, gale force winds and hail squalls.

The following season the crew took out first place in the BP Waratah Marathon from Watsons Bay to the Domain in October. Later in the season there were a couple of crew reshuffles with young Howard Christie (who later commented that Gordon was like a second father to him for a number of years) coming in as bowman from the successful Junior crew, while work commitments resulted in Ed Ifould stepping down as stroke. Ed later became the standout individual competitor from the Club in board, ski and ironman. Despite the late change, the crew went on to take a silver medal at the State after leading all the way only to be pipped on the line by Queenscliff. A similar finish resulted at the Australian titles in Perth, WA using a borrowed boat after an unprecedented three false starts in the final due to the savage shore break.

During the third, and what was to be his final season with the Club, Gordon informed members that he was selling up and moving to Cabarita NSW to buy and run a horse ranch, a move which stunned the boat crew and surprised other members. He may have felt he had achieved all he could at Bungan and was restless to escape Sydney and the big city drawbacks eg. traffic, etc. The crew continued their success but were swamped by a huge wave in their semi-final at the State titles held at South Curl Curl in very marginal conditions where most crews were happy if they made it out and back alive. The Australian Championships were held at Swansea-Belmont and after a sub-par row on the Saturday, the crew won their heat, quarter and semi on Sunday to make the final. It was overcast with a moderate surf and the rowers were determined to achieve a gold medal for Gordon. In what *The Sydney Morning Herald* described as a "stirring boat final", Coogee took the honours with Bungan again finishing second. It was an emotional moment when "The Carnival is Over" was played over the PA system, knowing it was the end of a special era for the Club.



Probably the best feature of Gordon's impact on Bungan was the realisation by members that the Club and its members could match it with any club in the country. He also was very insistent that the boat crew(s) should be involved in all facets of the Club, particularly in meeting their patrol obligations, and not regard themselves as special. Having something of a larrikin streak, and finding kindred souls within the club, he particularly enjoyed the social occasions like "Sippers" (drinks after patrol) where Jim Maitland recalls one of his party tricks was crushing an empty beer can on an unsuspecting member's head.

A "Hopalong Harmon" night at the Club was a farewell for Gordon, but later that winter the committee resolved to award him life membership because of his contribution to the transformation of the Club and he returned for the AGM and the presentation.

The move to Cabarita was not a success either personally or financially for Gordon, but it was at Cabarita SLSC that he first became interested in IRBs and was involved in a number of rescues there using the IRB. In the following years he became a member and sometimes the caretaker of various clubs including Tugun, Queensland, Casuarina Northern Territory (where he helped form their first boat crews), Stanwell Park, Byron Bay, South West Rocks, Mermaid Beach and Rainbow Beach Queensland. At South West Rocks SLSC, where he was the caretaker, Gordon was called upon to perform a number of rescues in hazardous conditions as IRB driver.

After retiring from competitive sweeping, Gordon moved to various locations on the North Coast of NSW where he concentrated on researching the history of surfboats, always a work in progress. His last residence was at Ulmarra near Grafton and he moved from there to an aged care facility at Maclean where he died on 15 April 2020.

Gordon was a colourful character who occasionally fell short of being a model citizen, but as a sweep, coach and motivator, he had few equals, and there would be many in surf life saving who would acknowledge the positive effect he had on their lives. He returned to Bungan briefly on a number of occasions over the years in an effort to foster a boat crew. He made an indelible impression on the club and there was no doubting his sincerity when he said that his years at Bungan were the most enjoyable he had spent in surf life saving.

## IRB CAPTAIN'S REPORT

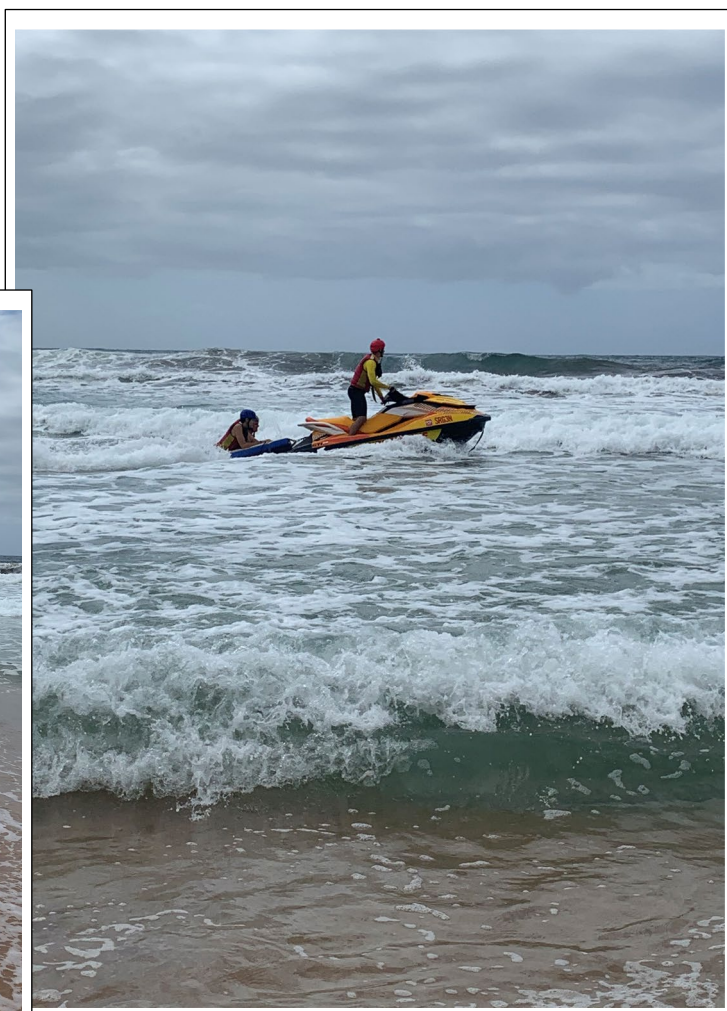

# Notes of the Financial Statements

## Bungan Beach Surf Life Saving Club Inc. For the year ended 31 May 2020

### Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

The financial statements are special purpose financial statements prepared in order to satisfy the financial reporting requirements of the Associations Incorporation Act 2009 (NSW), the Charitable Fundraising Act 1991 (NSW) and the Australian Charities and Not-for-Profits Commission Act 2012 (Cth) and the club's constitution. The Board of Directors have determined that the association is not a reporting entity.

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the requirements of the above acts and regulations, the club's constitution and the following Australian Accounting Standards:

AASB 101 Presentation of Financial Statements

AASB 107 Statements of Cash Flows

AASB 108 Accounting Policies, Changes in Accounting Estimates and Errors

AASB 1031 Materiality

AASB 1048 Interpretation of Accounting Standards AASB

1054 Australian Additional Disclosures

No other Accounting Standards, Australian Accounting Interpretations or other authoritative pronouncements of the Australian Accounting Standards Board have been applied.

The financial statements have been prepared on an accruals basis and are based on historic costs and do not take into account changing money values or, except where stated specifically, current valuations of non-current assets. The following significant accounting policies, which are consistent with the previous period unless stated otherwise, have been adopted in the preparation of these financial statements.

### Income Tax

No provision for income tax has been raised as the Association is exempt from income tax under Div 50 of the *Income Tax Assessment Act 1997*.

### Cash and Cash Equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents comprises cash on hand, demand deposits and short-term investments which are readily convertible to known amounts of cash and which are subject to an insignificant risk of change in value. Bank overdrafts are presented within current liabilities on the statement of financial position.

### Property, Plant and Equipment (PPE)

Leasehold improvements and office equipment are carried at cost less, where applicable, any accumulated depreciation.

In the event the carrying value of plant and equipment is greater than the estimated recoverable amount, the carrying value is written down immediately to the estimated recoverable amount. A formal assessment of recoverable amount is made when impairment indicators are present.

Subsequent costs are included in the asset's carrying amount or recognised as a separate asset, as appropriate, only when it is probable that future economic benefits associated with the item will flow to the association and the cost of the item can be

measured reliably. All other repairs and maintenance are charged to the statement of comprehensive income during the financial period in which they are incurred.

### Depreciation

The depreciation method and useful life used for items of property, plant and equipment (excluding freehold land) reflects the pattern in which their future economic benefits are expected to be consumed by the association. Depreciation commences from the time the asset is held ready for use. Leasehold improvements are depreciated over the shorter of either the unexpired period of the lease or the estimated useful lives of the improvements. The depreciation method and useful life of assets is reviewed annually to ensure they are still appropriate.

An asset's carrying amount is written down immediately to its recoverable amount if the asset's carrying amount is greater than its estimated recoverable amount.

Gains and losses on disposals are determined by comparing proceeds with the carrying amount. These gains or losses are recognised in profit or loss. When revalued assets are sold, amounts included in the revaluation surplus relating to that asset are transferred to retained earnings.

### Accounts Receivable and Other Debtors

Accounts receivable and other debtors include amounts due from members as well as amounts receivable from donors. Receivables expected to be collected within 12 months of the end of the reporting period are classified as current assets. All other receivables are classified as non-current assets.

### Goods and Services Tax (GST)

Revenues, expenses and assets are recognised net of the amount of GST, except where the amount of GST incurred is not recoverable from the Australian Taxation Office (ATO). Receivables and payables are stated inclusive of the amount of GST receivable or payable. The net amount of GST recoverable from, or payable to, the ATO is included with other receivables or payables in the assets and liabilities statement.

### Financial Instruments

#### *Recognition, initial measurement and derecognition*

Financial assets and financial liabilities are recognised when the Association becomes a party to the contractual provisions of the financial instrument, and are measured initially at fair value adjusted by transaction costs, except for those carried at fair value through profit or loss, which are measured initially at fair value. Subsequent measurement of financial assets and financial liabilities are described below.

Financial assets are derecognised when the contractual rights to the cash flows from the financial asset expire, or when the financial asset and all substantial risks and rewards are transferred. A financial liability is derecognised when it is extinguished, discharged, cancelled or expires.

#### *Classification and subsequent measurement of financial assets*

Except for those trade receivables that do not contain a significant financing component and are measured at the transaction price, all financial assets are initially measured at fair value adjusted for transaction costs (where applicable).

For the purpose of subsequent measurement, financial assets other than those designated as effective hedging instruments are classified into the following categories upon initial recognition:

- amortised cost

- fair value through profit or loss (FVPL)
- equity instruments at fair value through other comprehensive income (FVOCI)

All income and expenses relating to financial assets that are recognised in profit or loss are presented within finance costs, finance income or other financial items, except for impairment of trade receivables which is presented within other expenses.

Classifications are determined by both:

- The entities business model for managing the financial asset
- The contractual cash flow characteristics of the financial assets

All income and expenses relating to financial assets that are recognised in profit or loss are presented within finance costs, finance income or other financial items, except for impairment of trade receivables, which is presented within other expenses.

#### *Subsequent measurement financial assets*

##### *Financial assets at amortised cost*

Financial assets are measured at amortised cost if the assets meet the following conditions (and are not designated as FVPL):

- they are held within a business model whose objective is to hold the financial assets and collect its contractual cash flows
- the contractual terms of the financial assets give rise to cash flows that are solely payments of principal and interest on the principal amount outstanding

After initial recognition, these are measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method. Discounting is omitted where the effect of discounting is immaterial. The Association's cash and cash equivalents, trade and most other receivables fall into this category of financial instruments as well as long-term deposits that were previously classified as held-to-maturity under AASB 139.

##### *Financial assets at fair value through profit or loss (FVPL)*

Financial assets that are held within a different business model other than 'hold to collect' or 'hold to collect and sell' are categorised at fair value through profit and loss. Further, irrespective of business model financial assets whose contractual cash flows are not solely payments of principal and interest are accounted for at FVPL. All derivative financial instruments fall into this category, except for those designated as effective hedging instruments, for which the hedge accounting requirements apply (see below).

##### *Equity instruments at fair value through other comprehensive income (Equity FVOCI)*

Investments in equity instruments that are not held for trading are eligible for an irrevocable election at inception to be measured at FVOCI. Under Equity FVOCI, subsequent movements in fair value are recognised in other comprehensive income and are never reclassified to profit or loss. Dividend from these investments continue to be recorded as other income within the profit or loss unless the dividend clearly represents return of capital.

##### *Impairment of Financial assets*

AASB 9's impairment requirements use more forward looking information to recognize expected credit losses - the 'expected credit losses (ECL) model'. Instruments within the scope of the new requirements included loans and other debt-type financial assets measured at amortised cost and FVOCI, trade receivables and loan commitments and some financial guarantee contracts (for the issuer) that are not measured at fair value through profit or loss.

The Association considers a broad range of information when assessing credit risk and measuring expected credit losses, including past events, current conditions, reasonable and supportable forecasts that affect the expected collectability of the future cash flows of the instrument.

In applying this forward-looking approach, a distinction is made between:

- financial instruments that have not deteriorated significantly in credit quality since initial recognition or that have low credit risk ('Stage 1') and



- financial instruments that have deteriorated significantly in credit quality since initial recognition and whose credit risk is not low ('Stage 2').

'Stage 3' would cover financial assets that have objective evidence of impairment at the reporting date.

'12-month expected credit losses' are recognised for the first category while 'lifetime expected credit losses' are recognised for the second category.

Measurement of the expected credit losses is determined by a probability-weighted estimate of credit losses over the expected life of the financial instrument.

### *Trade and other receivables*

The Association makes use of a simplified approach in accounting for trade and other receivables and records the loss allowance at the amount equal to the expected lifetime credit losses. In using this practical expedient, the Association uses its historical experience, external indicators and forward-looking information to calculate the expected credit losses using a provision matrix.

### *Classification and measurement of financial liabilities*

As the accounting for financial liabilities remains largely unchanged from AASB 139, the Association's financial liabilities were not impacted by the adoption of AASB 9. However, for completeness, the accounting policy is disclosed below.

The Association's financial liabilities include borrowings and trade and other payables.

Financial liabilities are initially measured at fair value, and, where applicable, adjusted for transaction costs unless the Association designated a financial liability at fair value through profit or loss.

Subsequently, financial liabilities are measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method except for derivatives and financial liabilities designated at FVPL, which are carried subsequently at fair value with gains or losses recognised in profit or loss (other than derivative financial instruments that are designated and effective as hedging instruments).

All interest-related charges and, if applicable, changes in an instrument's fair value that are reported in profit or loss are included within finance costs or finance income.

## **Revenue and Other Income**

Revenue is measured at the fair value of the consideration received or receivable after taking into account any trade discounts and volume rebates allowed. For this purpose, deferred consideration is not discounted to present values when recognising revenue.

Interest revenue is recognised using the effective interest method, which for floating rate financial assets is the rate inherent in the instrument. Dividend revenue is recognised when the right to receive a dividend has been established.

Grant and donation income is recognised when the entity obtains control over the funds, which is generally at the time of receipt.

If conditions are attached to the grant that must be satisfied before the association is eligible to receive the contribution, recognition of the grant as revenue will be deferred until those conditions are satisfied.

All revenue is stated net of the amount of goods and services tax.

## **Inventories**

Inventories comprises goods for resale at no or nominal consideration as part of the Association's charitable activities. Inventories may be purchased or received by way of donation.

### Goods for resale

Inventories of goods for resale are valued at the lower of cost and net realisable value. No value is ascribed to goods for resale that have been donated to the Association where fair value cannot be reliably determined. Net realisable value is the estimated selling price in the ordinary course of business, less any applicable selling expenses.

### Accounts Payable and Other Payables

Accounts payable and other payables represent the liability outstanding at the end of the reporting period for goods and services received by the association during the reporting period that remain unpaid. The balance is recognised as a current liability with the amounts normally paid within 30 days of recognition of the liability.



## Independent Auditor's Report

#### Qualified Opinion

I have audited the accompanying financial report, being a special purpose financial report, of Bungan Beach Surf Life Saving Club Inc. (the Association), which comprises the statement of financial position as at 31 May 2020, the statement of profit and loss and other comprehensive income, statement of changes in equity, statement of cash flows for the year then ended, notes comprising a summary of significant accounting policies and other explanatory information, and the responsible entities' declaration.

In my opinion, except for the effects of the matter described in the *Basis of Qualified Opinion* section of my report, the financial report of the Bungan Beach Surf Life Saving Club Inc. as at 31 May 2020 presents fairly in all material aspects the financial position of the Bungan Beach Surf Life Saving Club Inc. and its financial performance for the year then ended in accordance with the basis of accounting described in Note 1 to the financial report and satisfies the requirements of the Charitable Fundraising Act 1991 (NSW), the Associations Incorporation Act 2009 (NSW), the Australian Charities and Not-for-Profits Act 2012 (Cth) and the Club's constitution including:

The Board of Directors' responsibility also includes such internal control as the Board of Directors determine is necessary to enable the preparation of a financial report that gives a true and fair view and is free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

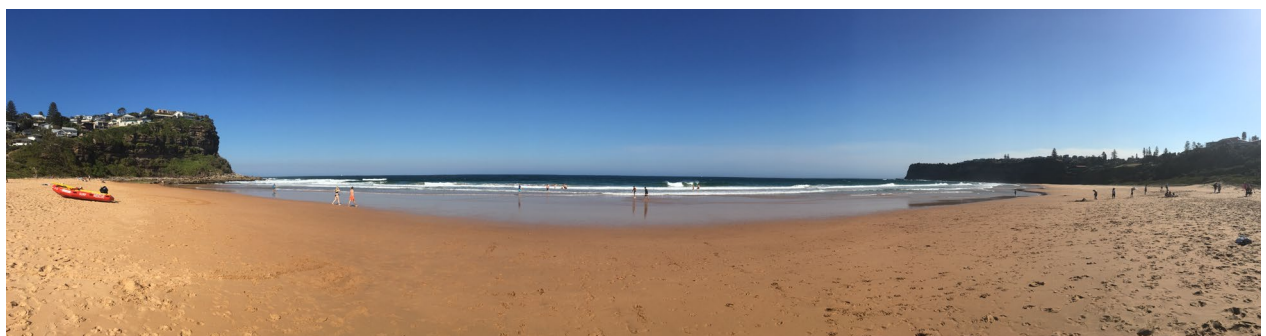
